# **President's Corner**



Land of Enchantment (LOE) Guides has some hot new properties in the Chama, New Mexico area. Helen Zagona, Mary and I fished with Jesse Lee, one of LOE's guides, for two days in June. The first

day, we fished the Chama River below the town of

Chama on one of the Oso Piccolo Ranches and caught some huge Browns. In the afternoon, we fished Wolf Creek, also on an Oso Piccolo Ranch, but north of Chama. The stream has lots of smaller, wary Brown Trout who are willing to take a dry fly if they aren't spooked first.

We fished the real gem, however, on the second day. The upper Brazos River runs through the High Timber Ranch (HTR) at an altitude of between 9,000 and 10,000 feet. Getting there requires driving two hours over ten miles of unimproved dirt road, but the scenery and wildlife are spectacular. There has been so much moisture this year (Noah and Shane tried to drive there on June 2<sup>nd</sup> but were blocked by snow drifts) that the forests and meadows are healthy and lush. HTR has about five miles of the Brazos River within its boundaries, but we didn't fish much more than a mile of it. All of the upper Brazos River is on private property and hasn't been stocked in generations, so all of the trout are wild. We started in a deep pool at the mouth of a slot canyon (the canyon is too narrow and pool too deep to wade further into it). After pulling four or five nice Brook and Rainbow Trout out of that pool (and missing a few more), we fished upstream through an open meadow. Every pool or deep trough in the stream held Brooks up to 16 inches and Rainbows up to 20 plus inches. Most of the day, we fished a dry-dropper rig and the fish seemed to take the dry and the dropper about equally. The dry was a size 12, purple Hippie Stomper. It is an attractor fly that looks fairly simple to tie but is quite effective. Check it out on You-Tube.

All reports are that the Club trip to the North Platte River in June was another roaring success. Kudos goes to Chuck Mueller for organizing another great trip. It sounds like everyone had a good time and caught some of the enormous trout that the North Platte is famous for. Check out the pictures on the Club's Facebook page if you haven't already.

# <u>July 2015</u>

#### **Conejos Camping Trip**

Almost every year the Club has a trip to the Conejos River to fish. This is great time of the year because the runoff is over with, the weather is

nice and the insect hatches are in full swing. So for anyone that is interested, I am planning a trip to the Conejos and nearby waters from July 9 to July 12. I will be camping in the Rio Grande National Forest Mogote Campground.

A link to the campground information is http://www.fs.usda.gov/recarea/riogrande/recarea/?r ecid=29568. This is about 1-mile north of the Fox Creek store on Highway 17. I will take the MVFF banner with me and hang it at the campsite so that anyone dropping in can find my camp. I plan to camp in the Upper Loop. There is also a Lower Loop at the campground. It is near the river but I have found the mosquitoes are fierce in the evenings. If mosquitoes "love you", I recommend that you stay in the Upper Loop.

An option to camping is to stay at the cabins of the Conejos River Anglers flyshop in Mogote. The link is <u>http://www.conejosriveranglers.com/</u> We have stayed there many times and they are comfortable. They will sleep 3 to 4 per cabin and have small kitchens. They also have "guide and sleep" deals that are very good and the guides will put you on fish.

Each day last year we had a Green Drake hatch around 11am that lasted a couple of hours. Green Drakes must taste good to the trout because the surface action was intense.

This is beautiful time of the year to camp, but plan on an afternoon thundershower.

**Getting There:** GPS Info. (Latitude, Longitude): 37.06472, -106.23444, or 37°3'53"N, 106°14'4"W

From Antonito, Colorado, go west on Highway 17 about 15 miles to the campground access road on your left, it is well marked. Travel 1/4 mile and turn right into the Upper Loop Road.

# **Fishing Reports**

**6/27/15, Frances Curtis and Debbie Hamlyn** — Hours: 8:30a.m. – 4:30p.m. We started the morning crossing the upper bridge and headed downstream, and we caught several fish from the large pool after you go through the gate. I landed two nice 12" or so rainbows in that pool and lost a couple more that were equally large. The rest were anywhere from 6–9 inches or so. Even though the fish were small, they were plentiful. We caught more than our share of chubs as well. We didn't catch anything down at the pool that the ladies group calls the caves. The fish I caught at the large pool were caught on a nice size bright purple/blue prince nymph, which was a very successful fly for me that morning, until it got caught on the other side of the river, and was gone.

Around 2:00 we drove down to the lower section, crossed the bridge and went upstream, crossing through the gate. I caught about 6 fish in the shallow riffles using a brown prince nymph, which the fish loved that day. We never used anything other than prince nymphs, without any type of dropper or weight, and were very successful that day. We read about the green rock worms and couldn't wait to use them, but for that day, we were not successful with that fly. All in all, I would say we caught 15 rainbows of different sizes, but mostly small.

I went up to the lease in May, and I just had to add this, I caught a beautiful, large rainbow in the caves pool at the upper river. That day was a prince nymph/copper john dropper combo. In that same pool, I caught 5 beautiful rainbows within a short period of about 30 minutes, from around 12:30 – 1:00. When a hooked fish was being brought in, 4–6 large fish would come flying out of the hole to chase either my other fly or the fish.

It just proved to me there are many large, beautiful rainbows in that hole and on that river. What a fun sport.

**6/24/15, George Thomas & Ed Wooff** — On our way home from the lease. Fishing remains GOOD!

30 plus fish. Water is clear but low. We fished the lower bridge, the midsection and the canyon. The fish are larger, 8–9 inch, three12's. Of course I farmed 3 large fish. Ed landed a nice 14–inch fat rainbow. Hot fly's were size 16/18 Prince Nymphs, no weight, dead drifted in the riffles. For deep water (Tim Mack's) Peñasco Chub or a Sculpzilla size 6/8.

**6/23/15, Blaine Goss** — Drove up to the lease today. Water was clear and plentiful. Caught 10 small rainbows on small flies (brown nymph size 16) and 3 bigger rainbows (16,14,14) on big flies (bunny leaches, etc.). Chubs were often on the line as well. The bigger fish were in the upper section in deep holes. Saw big fish in the lower section, but didn't catch any there. No more algae!

6/21/15, Carl E. Lieberwirth — Fathers Day Sunday June 21, 2015. My Wife and Daughter took me to the lease for Fathers Day. Arrived about 1:30pm. Water was crystal clear and levels were good. Fished the upper end down to the Middle Falls. Caught 6, 4" to 8" fish, missed a few others and saw a few big fish in areas where I could not get a fly to them. Used a Copper John and Green Rock Worm, all fish took the Rock Worm. Went to the lower end around 4:30. Caught a couple of smaller fish working down towards the Falls. In the Lower falls I caught a 16" again on the Green Rock Worm. Spooked a big brute below the falls, thought it was a carp at first. Changed to a Triple Wing Elk Hair Caddis and fished top water back up to the Bridge. Couple of small fish then caught an 18" in the Cottonwood stretch. Overall, an Awesome Fathers Day.

**6/20/15, Lynn Shuttlesworth** — I wanted to get a report to you from this past Saturday, June 20<sup>th</sup>. My son, (Ryan), and I hiked down to the (big) waterfall, and, after politely asking 3 non-members to not fish our lease, Ryan fished back toward the big barn, and I went the other way. In a little over 2 hours, he caught 6 small Rainbows, and 2 12-inchers. I caught 13 small ones, a 12" Bow, and a 14" Bow. We were single nymphing, (16 Prince Nymph, 16 Hare's Ear), and I caught the big guy on a size 14 Soft Hackle, (1<sup>st</sup> cast in some riffles). I think I would have caught more, bigger fish if those 3 kids hadn't spooked them before we got there. Anyway, after catching 28 fish in a little over 2 hours, it was 94 degrees, and we decided to head home. However, all in all, a really good day!

6/14/15, Patrick Lamb -

location = Lease, water\_vol = Normal

water\_clarity = Murky

weather = Some showers, had rained overnight up-

stream, making water slightly murky

hatches = Some caddis mid-day

details = One 12" fat rainbow and six smaller ones. Prince nymph worked well in deeper water. Smaller fish took No. 16 orange stimulator off top of water near banks.

**6/11/15, George Thomas & Ed Wooff** — Started fishing about 8:30am. Water--clear, plenty & running good. Fish were visible in numerous locations. Fished both directions from lower bridge in morning and from upper bridge, both directions, in the afternoon! Fish Caught-- Approx 30+ Rainbows 4"-10", 1 Brown -12". It seems we are getting some reproduction as we have not stocked anything below 6" in over one year!! Other fish were hooked and not netted! Best Flies--#18 prince nymph, #18 Pheasant Mayfly nymph featured in May Liars & Tyers (see website, May coming events), Pine Squirrel Leech, streamers. The algae has decreased and fishing the pine squirrel leach with the streamer produced many strikes.

# Lease Information

Permits to fish the Club leased waters on the Rio Peñasco can be obtained from Jim Hulsey (575–524–1880), Tom Wobbe (575–522–5437) and Donna Mabie (575–522–3810) in Las Cruces. Permits can be obtained from the land owner, but you should phone (575–687–3362) the night before to ensure someone will be there to sell them to you. Permits can be ordered through the club web page (mvff.org) by filling out the form and mailing as directed. Cost is \$25.00 per day. Kids under 18 fish free but must be accompanied by an adult club member with a permit. You must be a current member (current dues have been paid) of MVFF to fish the lease. Please wear your MVFF identification badge while on the property. New or replacement badges can be obtained by contacting Jim Hulsey. In addition, members can purchase a one-day, one-time permit for guests.

#### Directions to the Lease:

Follow NM 82 east from Cloudcroft, NM or west from Artesia, NM. The turn off to the lease is located on the right side of the road about 100 yards before mile marker 54 coming from Cloudcroft or 100 yards on the left past mile marker 54 coming from Artesia.
