President's Corner



David Carmichael Annual Banquet Recap

It's February and another successful annual banquet is in the books. Once again, we had an excellent turnout with about 100 club members in attendance. Our guest speaker at the banquet was Molly

Semenik, who spoke with us about her book, 25 Best Off-the-Beaten-Path Montana Fly Fishing Streams, published by Stonefly Press. The book is well written and very nicely illustrated, with many fine color maps and photographs (most taken my Molly herself). Miriam and I used the book last summer, and we found the maps to be especially well done; they are far more detailed and informative than those one sees in most fly-fishing books. There are also a lot of useful tips, such as what flies and rigs to use, details of wading conditions, and the best restaurants and bars to be found near each of the streams. We heard even more interesting details during the talk, like the story of a Little Yellow Sally hatch after dark, and close encounters with moose and mountain lions. In fact, the book contains one of the more detailed discussions of wildlife safety that I've seen in a fishing guidebook. Molly is a casting champion and Certified Instructor, so it should come as no surprise that her book includes a section on casting techniques for small streams. Molly donated one copy of her book to our raffle, and sold a dozen or so more after her presentation, but if you missed out and would like to purchase a copy, you can visit https://stoneflypress.com and pick one up, or go to Molly's webpage at www.tietheknotflyfishing.com.

On Friday before the banquet, club members Lisa Meyer, Rick Wessel and I hosted Molly on a quick fishing trip to the club lease on the Rio Peñasco. Although it was cold in the morning, after enjoying a hot lunch of green chile stew, we were favored with clear skies, temperatures in the 60s, hardly any wind, and a substantial BWO hatch that lasted from about 11am to 2pm. Fishing was challenging, but everyone hooked some nice trout. Rick caught the largest, a nice brown trout that I estimated to be 18 inches, and the smallest, a 4-inch rainbow with parr marks. That small fish is a good sign, as it is a wild rainbow that resulted from successful reproduction on either our lease or on Mulcock Ranch upstream. There is more algae on the river bottom than I've seen in past winters, and that makes it tough to bounce nymphs along the bottom without snagging vegetation. Nevertheless, there are some quality fish out there, and the weather has been mild enough that fishing the lease was fun, even in the middle of winter. The deeper holes were by far the most productive areas.

Miscellaneous Club Business

There were several awards and other sorts of club business items announced at the banquet. First were the results of the election of club officers. At our last meeting of the Executive Board, the members voted to keep last year's officers in their current positions for the upcoming year. In other words, you're stuck with us for another year. However, we are hopeful that a few members who have not yet served on the Executive Board will come forward this year and bring some new perspectives and energy to the Board. Feel

free to contact any of the current Board members if you are so inclined.

We all know that if we didn't have a lease on the Rio Peñasco, we would probably have many fewer members. We are privileged to have ready access to such a nice little spring creek that is fishable all year, and it was a pleasure to present Jim and Earlene Ellett with a \$100 gift certificate to The Lodge in Cloudcroft as a token of our appreciation for allowing us to visit their property as our home waters.

It was an honor to present Ron Bellerose a framed Rio Grande cutthroat print (by Michelle Arterburn) as a thank you for his decade of service as Program Lead for Project Healing Waters. The framing was done by MAS Arts in downtown Las Cruces; they have done a great job with three such club awards, so if you need any framing done, check them out at 126 South Main. Ron will continue to work with our local vets and with the Warriors Resilience Battalion at Fort Bliss, but will be doing so outside the PHW administrative structure.

I would also like to thank the Executive Board for the Brodin Gallatin S2 landing net given to me on behalf of the club. It so happens that I fell on my old net and broke it, so this replacement is much appreciated. The job of club president is something of a commitment, but as I mentioned at the banquet, I am

very appreciative of all the help and support we receive from many club members. I am proud that we have a lot of resources in the club: members with special skills, talents or businesses that relate directly to our club mission in fly fishing, conservation and education. Just over the past couple of weeks, in connection with the banquet, we've seen several examples. We hosted Molly for dinner at Ardovino's Desert Crossing, owned by board member Robert Ardovino, and we all enjoyed the banquet meal catered by club members Josie and Teako Nunn, owners of Sparkey's in Hatch, home of the best green chile cheese burger in the state. Three of the four guided fly fishing trips we raffled off involve club members: Bob Widgren guiding at Trinchera Ranch, Dillon Martinez guiding for Wolf Creek Anglers, and Eric Claassen at the Taos Fly Shop. The Rio Grande cutthroat print used for Ron's award is by artist and club member Michelle Arterburn. We have another member, Tim Mack, who is a professional fly tier, and a number of board members who have business experience, legal backgrounds, desktop publishing skills, teaching experience and great organizational skills. The club has had another very active and successful year, but our programs and accomplishments would not be possible without the efforts of all the members who contribute in whatever ways they can. I thank you all.

Fly Fishers International

Prior to speaking at the banquet about the process of researching her book, Molly taught two fly casting classes in the morning that day, and led club members through the FFI Casting Skills Challenge on the following Sunday morning. We had 7 participants in the beginner class which focused on the "pick up and lay down" cast, the basic overhand cast, and an introduction to the roll cast. In the advanced class, 9 club members learned how to double-haul, and then we worked on the roll cast and how it transitions into spey and Skagit casting. On Sunday, about a dozen club members were introduced to the Bronze Level of the FFI Casting Skills Challenge. This activity was not so much about competition; rather the challenge provides a fun way to measure one's skills at casting for distance and accuracy while using a variety of casts commonly required in actual fishing conditions.

In addition to being a casting champion, Molly is also a nationally recognized Master Certified Instructor in the FFI rating system. Moreover, she is a member of the Casting Board of Governors for FFI, and is one of the authors of the FFI fly casting skills curriculum. The main reason for conducting the skills challenge activity was to introduce it to club members and the MVFF Education Committee so that we can recreate the skills challenge for other club members on a regular basis. This will be a good way to help club members practice their casting and measure their improvement. The board members will be discussing how we might proceed with these activities in the

of how the casting skills and instruction activities are structured, check out the Fly Fishers International learning center on their website at https://flyfishersinternational.org/Education/Learning-Center/Fly-Fishing-Skills. In the next couple of months, FFI will also be providing ten new fly casting

videos that will be available at no charge for FFI members and non-members.

Bob and Lee Widgren, owners of Custom Fly Rod Crafters (www.flyrodcrafters.com) in Albuquerque, NM donated the Trinchera Ranch trip on which Bob will serve as the guide. Bob and Lee provide a complete line of rod building blanks, components, tools and supplies, including Sage, TFO, Arctos, Mystic and St. Croix blanks, Lemke reel seats, and epoxies. Give them a call if you're interested in building a rod, or if you'd like to arrange to have Bob introduce you to a piece of water (he guides for The Solitary Angler fishing club https://thesolitaryangler.com).

Noah Parker, owner of Land of Enchantment Guides (https://loeglyfishing.com) out of Velarde, NM donated a fly fishing trip for two. LOE guides work on waters throughout northern New Mexico and southern Colorado, although they are probably best known for their knowledge of the Rio Grande, Brazos and Chamarivers. Noah is a long-time good friend of the MVFF who has been a guest speaker at some of our club meetings, and has donated guided trips for our raffles several times. He is also a very active and outspoken proponent of fisheries conservation measures in New Mexico and Colorado.

Last summer club board member Dillen Martinez began guiding for Wolf Creek Anglers in South Fork, Colorado (www.wolfcreekanglers.com). The shop donated a float trip for two, for which Dillen will be the

guide. Wolf Creek Anglers specializes on fishing the upper San Juan, and 40 miles of Gold Medal water on the Rio Grande, which flows right past the shop in South Fork, as well as some of the small headwater streams in the surrounding area. You may remember that company owner Brad Shallenberger spoke to the club last year, and noted that his wife manages lodging on site, making South Fork a convenient destination.

Club member Evan Claassen is the newest member of the Taos Fly Shop guide staff (https://taosflyshop.com). Taos Fly Shop was started by well known guide and author Taylor Streit, and is now run by his son Nick. Nick was on the U.S. Junior Fly Fishing team that placed 2nd in the 1998 world fly fishing competition. These folks know how to catch fish. The staff guides on the Rio Grande, Rio Costilla, Conejos, Cimarron and Red Rivers. MVFF Board Meeting Minutes

Monday, January 14, 2019 Submitted by Jeff Arterburn, Secretary

The MVFF Board meeting was called to order by David Carmichael at 7:00pm in the NMDG&F Conference room. Board members present were: Jeff Arterburn (Secretary), David Carmichael (President), Chuck Mueller (Treasurer), Bob Silver (Membership), Jim Sorenson, Jim Hulsey, Dillen Martinez and Ron Bellerose (designated acting board member for Tom Johnson). Board Members absent: Robert Ardovino and Tom Johnson (Vice President, is on a temporary leave of absence). No non–Board members were in attendance.

- Meeting Minutes: The minutes from the December 10, 2018 Board Meeting were approved as published in the January 2019 issue of the newsletter.
- Treasurer's Report: Chuck Mueller presented the Treasurer's report with available current account balance statement of \$10,782.78. The report was accepted by the Board.
- 3. **Membership Report:** Bob Silver reported 235 currently active members, with several new members joining in January 2018.
- 4. Fly Fishing Outreach: Ron reported that they are still having fly tying sessions on the second Tuesday of each month, but will be changing fly tying location to Ron's home starting in February. A proposal for an event with the Wounded Warrior Transition Battalion is under consideration. Ron is working with Mark Gaddy, and will likely take place in July 2019 with a fly tying session on Friday and fishing trip on Saturday. We've been asked to help host a youth fly fishing event at the Catwalk with the local group "Nuesto Gila" based in Silver City on Sunday January 20th. The event is planning for about 15-25 minority youths, and our goal is to provide at least one mentor for each 3 students. This will be a lot of fun and there will be delicious fajitas prepared hot from a disco for lunch! Jason Amaro is coordinating the event so please RSVP to him if you'd volunteer by amaro_jason@hotmail.com. Trout Unlimited is changing the fiscal year end to March 31st beginning in 2019 in order to improve the efficiency of operations. The TU national organization will apply to the IRS for this on behalf of the entire exempt group, and each chapter and council must formally authorize TU national to include it in the application. We will not be required to file a 990N for the short fiscal year and the next 990N filing with the IRS will not take place until after March 31, 2020. The GRG-TU is selling new logo T-shirts (\$20 each) as part of fund-raising for trout restoration and conservation efforts. There are several options for the payment of dues. A family is defined as a club member, their spouse and all children 17 years of age or under.



Lease Information

Permits to fish the Club leased waters on the Rio Peñasco can be obtained from Jim Hulsey (575–524–1880) or Bob Silver (575–522–6325) in Las Cruces. Permits can be obtained from the land owner, but you should phone (575–687–3362) the night before to ensure someone will be there to sell them to you. Permits can be ordered through the club web page (mvff.org) by filling out the form and mailing as directed or, if you had rather, you may pay through PayPal. Cost is \$25.00 per day. Kids under 18 fish free but must be accompanied by an adult club member with a permit. You must be a current member (current dues have been paid) of MVFF to fish the lease. Please wear your MVFF identification badge while on the property. New or replacement badges can be obtained by contacting Bob Silver. In addition, members may purchase 1–day, 1–time permits for up to 2 guests per trip. Each guest must have a permit. One–time means a person can go as a guest one time only and must be a member to ever go again.

Directions to the Lease:

Follow NM 82 east from Cloudcroft, NM or west from Artesia, NM. The turn off to the lease is located on the right side of the road about 100 yards before mile marker 54 coming from Cloudcroft or 100 yards on the left past mile marker 54 coming from Artesia.
