Environmental News

The Colorado Outdoor Recreation and Economy (CORE) act has been reintroduced in Congress this session. It passed the House of Representatives twice during the 116th legislative session with bipartisan support, but was never taken up by the Senate. A number of hunting, fishing, and outdoor recreation groups are supporting the bill once again. The act is designed to provide protection to several areas of high importance to hunters and anglers, including parts of the San Juan Mountains in southwestern Colorado, and the Thompson Divide region southwest of Glenwood Springs. The bill will protect 2,416 miles of cold-water streams, including 100 miles of cutthroat streams, and 12 cutthroat lakes. For more information,

Dam removals, and potential removals, continue to make news in the western United States. If you follow the news about the effects of dams on anadromous

fish species, and the efforts to accommodate fish movement towards their spawning grounds, you have probably heard about the Lower Snake River and the struggles of its salmon and steelhead populations. Indeed, the Snake River has just experienced the lowest salmon and steelhead returns in more than 200 years. ([Lower Snake River | Trout Unlimited](#))

Perhaps even more surprising and concerning is that these poor results follow the expenditure of \$17 billion in fish recovery and management programs. In other words, all the efforts made so far simply are not working. While several factors

have contributed to the continued decline of salmon and steelhead populations, it has become clear that the primary barrier (so to speak) to recovery is the presence of the four dams on the Lower Snake River. In what is a pretty remarkable turn of events, U. S. Representative Mike Simpson (R-ID) has proposed removing the four dams within the next decade. He and his staff estimate the cost of removal at \$33 billion, including the replacement of current agriculture, power generation and river transportation infrastructure. It remains to be seen whether Simpson's proposal will gain political traction, but as he says, failure to make substantial changes will doom Idaho's salmon and steelhead runs to extinction. Although fly anglers typically practice catch and release these days, many of us also enjoy consuming fish now and then, perhaps most commonly marine fish species. Indeed, fish are considered healthy and environmentally friendly alternatives to beef and

pork. So, it may come as something of a surprise and a disappointment to learn that fish are increasingly consuming microplastics. It has been known for years that many (most?) plastic products are not recycled, and that they take many years to break down in nature. What is perhaps less well understood is the extent to which microplastics are reaching the rivers and oceans where they are ingested by fish. Recent research has found that 386 marine fish species contained plastic, including 210 that are commercially important. The percentage of fish that contain plastics has increased four-fold since 2016, and

among some species, as many as 33% of tested fish contain plastics. The species most affected are those near the top of the food chain, such as sharks, groupers and tuna. Diversions, the Good Kind

It is probably the case that few of us in the MVFF need any convincing about the attractiveness of fly angling when compared to other forms of fishing. However, just in case you need to be reminded about why you stopped throwing lures with treble hooks, here is an article about the Emergency Room at the hospital in the town of Saranac Lake in upstate New York. The ER physician’s assistant and his staff maintain a display case of many of the lures they have removed from various parts of anglers’ bodies over the years. Some of the spoons, spinners, Lazy Ikes, Rattle Traps, etc. were affixed to very sensitive body parts, and just thinking about their extractions is enough to make one cringe. If you look closely at the photo, you may even see two or three flies nestled in between the crank baits, so be sure to wear your sunglasses on the water, and be careful of casting from the wrong side of your body in a stiff wind.

MVFF Founding Member Dies

We have received word of the passing of one of the 'Founding Members' of Mesilla Valley Flyfishers. Ronald 'Ron' Smorynski passed away after suffering a stroke on 20 February 2021 in Lacey, WA where he resided with his wife Sharon. Ron was 78 years of age and had been in failing health for some time.

Ron was president of MVFF in 1991 when the club was incorporated and in that capacity his signature is the one on the Certificate of Incorporation.

Ron was an avid fisherman and with Rex Johnson Jr. of Silver City co-authored the book 'Fly-Fishing in Southern New Mexico, Univ. of NM Press, 1998.' While living in Lacey, Ron was quite active in Trout Unlimited and in the South Sound Fly Fishers club of Olympia, WA. He held offices in both organizations and edited their newsletters prior to his illness.

- Hook— Size 10 Jig hook 60 degree - J20-B by Gamakatsu, 400 BL by Hanak or similar jig hook
- Head - Tungsten gold or rainbow, size 3.3mm to 3.5mm
- Thread - Blue 70 Denier or 6/0 Uni thread
- Tail - Amber Goose Biot
- Body - Peacock Herl
- Wire - Ultra wire, size BR in Blue
- Wing- White Goose Biot
- Thorax - Ice Dub in Peacock Black
- Casing - Blue Holo Tinsel, size large
- Legs - Hackle hen saddle, mottled brown or brown

There are several options for the payment of dues. A family is defined as a club member, their spouse and all children 17 years of age or under.



Lease Information

Permits to fish the Club leased waters on the Rio Peñasco can be obtained from Jim Hulsey (575-524-1880) or Bob Silver (575-522-6325) in Las Cruces. Permits can be obtained from the land owner, but you should phone (575-687-3362) the night before to ensure someone will be there to sell them to you. Permits can be ordered through the club web page (mvff.org) by filling out the form and mailing as directed or, if you had rather, you may pay through PayPal. Cost is \$25.00 per day. Kids under 18 fish free but must be accompanied by an adult club member with a permit. You must be a current member (current dues have been paid) of MVFF to fish the lease. Please wear your MVFF identification badge while on the property. New or replacement badges can be obtained by contacting Bob Silver. In addition, members may purchase 1-day, 1-time permits for up to 2 guests per trip. Each guest must have a permit. One-time means a person can go as a guest one time only and must be a member to ever go again.

Directions to the Lease:

Follow NM 82 east from Cloudcroft, NM or west from Artesia, NM. The turn off to the lease is located on the right side of the road about 100 yards before mile marker 54 coming from Cloudcroft or 100 yards on the left past mile marker 54 coming from Artesia.
