President's Corner

Winter Fishing. The dropping temperatures and shorter days mean some changes in tactics are necessary on the water. The springs that feed the Peñasco help

to moderate the drop in water temperature and the fish will continue to feed, but there are fewer insect hatch's that are worth their effort to move, so that means getting your fly patterns to the depth at which the fish are holding is most critical. It probably means you need to add more weight to get your nymph, bugger, worm or egg in front of the fish! I find winter fishing to be very rewarding, your footprints through the crusty layer of snow will likely be the only evidence of two-legged visitors, and the familiar tug and spray of water when you land a healthy, colorful, vigorous fish are even more satisfying to me than on a prime summer day. I usually don't expect the same numbers of fish to net, but a good hatch of BWO's will get the fish going and you can be very successful progressing through the hatch from nymphs to emergers and drys. The strong reproduction we have been getting in the stream means we have an excellent population of streamborn fish that are thriving and amply reward the angler's skill.

The December 14th Meeting will feature a presentation titled *Tackle and Techniques for the San Juan River* by John Tavenner, including video demonstrations to illustrate the critical skills of line-mending. John has fished the San Juan River since 1985, and began guiding soon after. John and his wife, Monica, started Sandstone Anglers, Inc. in 1999. John is an excellent instructor, and this will be a great opportunity to learn and hone your angling skills.

The election ballots for the 2010 MVFF Board will also be collected at the December meeting, with the

Fishing the Lease in Winter

Fishing for trout generally changes in the winter no matter where you are. But, I wanted to give those interested in wetting a line this winter some additional tips. Trout are most active in water that is 55 to 60 degrees Fahrenheit. In anything more or less, their activity slows down. If you have a stream thermometer, check the water temperature and put that in the Club's fishing report on the web page. It would be interesting to know. During the winter, fish spend less time hunting food and spend more time near the bottom to conserve energy where the current is slower. Likewise, insects that are a trout's prey are also affected by winter time temperatures. While insects such Bluewing Olives and midges still hatch, it happens later in the day once the sun has warmed the bottom where the nymphs live. Trout, by staying near the bottom, are closer to their prey when they emerge. Also consider the angle of the sun where you are fishing. You are much more visible to a trout when you are standing in the sunlight than when you are in the shade. Also some parts of a stream receive much less sun so fish may move to warmer parts of the stream like where a spring enters the stream. These are places where more insect activity may occur as well.

What to do? Fish deeper. If you aren't touching the bottom once in awhile add more weight in small increments until you do. The bugs are smaller in the winter too. A size 18 Pheasant Tail or Hares's Ear

with some flashback material is a good lease fly. Our fish spawn in the fall so try an egg pattern. Also during spawning fish are less actively feeding. Walk the stream bank very slowly and wear dark colors to avoid spooking fish. Better yet, try staying out of sight and observe the stream from a distance as much as possible. Look for small insect hatches or look for signs of feeding fish. Sunlight will reflect off the side of a fish as it turns catching emerging nymphs. Fish may become more active later in the morning or early in the afternoon as bugs begin emerging.

Google Earth and the Fishing Lease

A neat feature of Google Earth recent updates are the photos taken along roadways. In fact one is taken at the turn into the lease at Jim Ellett's house. To find the lease with Goggle Earth, find the "Fly To" box on the upper left side of the Google Earth search page. Type in, 4938 Rio Penasco Road, NM. This is the street address in Goggle Earth of Jim Ellett's ranch where the permit box is located. The address for the turnoff to the lower bridge is 4850 Rio Penasco Road, NM. Look for little camera icons on the road. Each is a picture taken by the Google Earth mapping vehicle at the spot. You can also pan the picture in a 360 degree circle to see the views to the side and back. Pan the photo at 4938 Rio Penasco to see the driveway into the lease. Try it and you'll see what I mean.

Thanksgiving on the Rio Peñasco

A week before Thanksgiving, my daughter Andi and I learned that the other members of our family would be traveling out of town over the holiday, so we decided to spend our Thanksgiving Day on the Rio Peñasco. And what a day it was. When we arrived shortly before noon, the air temperature was in the low 40s with a slight breeze under a clear, sunny sky. After a couple of hours some thin clouds moved in and the air became chilly quickly, but it was still a productive day on the water. Andi caught 8 fish and I caught 5, including four rainbow trout apiece, all of which were chunky and feisty, and ranging in size from 13-15 inches. We both used March Brown Baden Powell special edition 5wt backpacking rods; they are great for nymphing and pack down into an 18 inch case.

The river was running a little high, but still very clear; the water is as beautiful as I've ever seen it, and the bright turquoise blues below the falls are especially striking. Midges were coming off the water by noon, but we didn't see any surface feeding activity, so we soaked a seine for a couple of minutes and found large numbers of small mayfly nymphs (size 20 or 22) and some large drifting caddis larvae, either green rock worms or spotted sedge. All the trout I caught were hooked on a green chenille rock worm pattern or bead head olive hare's ear. All the trout Andi caught went for a size 18 bead head flashback PT.

Interestingly, the timing of the seasons seems a bit out of whack; Andi caught a 15 inch brightly colored male rainbow in the upper part of the lease, and as she was releasing the fish it released a load of milt. It seems rather early for rainbow spawning activity; perhaps other club members can provide some insight on this.

On this trip we saw many deer, hawks and a porcupine on the lease, and saw a few elk along the highway. As we had our Thanksgiving dinner (baked turkey breast, smoked salmon, pumpkin pie and dried cranberries) at the bank of the river, listening to the waterfall and watching the wildlife, we were truly thankful that we have such a great place to fish and talk and enjoy nature. I hope all of you had an enjoyable and meaningful holiday too.

MVFF Board Meeting Minutes Monday, November 16, 2009 Submitted by Donna Mabie, Secretary

The MVFF Board meeting, presided over by President Jeff Arterburn, was called to order at 7:00pm in the NMDG&F Conference Room.

In attendance were board members Tom Wobbe, Jeff Arterburn, Robert Silver, George Thomas, Paul Turner, Gary Mann, Jim Sorenson, Donna Mabie, and guest attendees Richard Keding, Terry and Sue Spence, Ron Bellerose, Jim Hulsey and Devon Fletcher.

- 1. Minutes of the October Board Meeting were approved as published in the November newsletter.
- 2. The Treasurer's report presented by Gary Mann was approved. The Report shows the Club to have a balance of \$11,629.
- 3. Tom Wobbe reported that there are 216 paid members, 75 of which are from Las Cruces, 60 from El Paso and the rest from elsewhere.
- 4. A vote will be taken at the December general meeting for election of board members. The ballot will be included in the December newsletter and Tom Wobbe will send out an e-mail ballot with the names.
- 5. A letter was sent to the persons breaking the Rio Peñasco fishing rules mentioned last month and an apology was received by the club as well as a check.


Lease Information

Permits to fish the Club leased waters on the Rio Peñasco can be obtained from any of the Club Officers or Board Members and are also available at the *Angler's Nook* (575-522-3810) in Las Cruces and the ATF fly shop in El Paso (915-225-0570.) Permits can be obtained from the land owner, but you should phone (575-687-3362) the night before to ensure someone will be there to sell them to you. Permits can be ordered through the club web page (mvff.org) by filling out the form and mailing as directed. Cost is \$25.00 per day. Kids under 18 fish free but must

be accompanied by an adult club member with a permit. You must be a current member of MVFF to fish the lease. Please wear your MVFF identification badge while on the property. New or replacement badges can be obtained by contacting Jim Hulsey. In addition, members can purchase a one-day, one-time permit for out of town guests.

Directions to the Lease:

Follow NM 82 east from Cloudcroft, NM or west from Artesia, NM. The turn off to the lease is located on the right side of the road about 100 yards before mile marker 54 coming from Cloudcroft or 100 yards on the left past mile marker 54 coming from Artesia.
