Club Trip to the San Juan

The Club had its spring outing to the San Juan River on 24—26 June. The trip was postponed from the originally planned dates because of the high volume of water (5,000 cfs) being released from Navajo dam by the Bureau of Reclamation. Due to an unfortunate drowning a few days prior to our trip, the water flows were reduced sooner than planned and were flowing at 500 cfs. Attendance was low this time with only about 14-15 members participating. That's unfortunate because the fishing was great. The river has needed a good flushing for some time and the

high volumes released this spring seem to have really helped. The fish were healthy and put up tremendous battles when hooked. Everyone was reporting that they caught more fish than they had in years. Sizes of the fish ranged from 3 or 4 inches up to 20+ inches.

There was a potluck dinner on Saturday night where everyone had a great meal, told a few fishing stories and enjoyed great camaraderie.

Permits

There has been some confusion concerning permits to fish the Lease. Some members, especially new members, have been waiting until they are ready to go fishing to purchase permits. These last minute efforts sometimes cause confusion and frustration on both the members selling the permits and the fishermen wanting to go fishing. Everyone should be aware that the permits are not dated when sold and may be used whenever desired. If you plan fishing the Lease sometime in the future go ahead and purchase the permit and get your ID badge well in advance. Makes it easier on everyone.

Fly Casting Clinic

Each fall the MVFF conducts a fly casting clinic if there is enough interest. The clinics are held at NMSU's Alumni Pond so that water will add realism to the instruction, i.e. the drag on the line as it is lifted from the water. A clinic is planned for this fall, September or October prior to the San Juan trip, if there is sufficient interest.

If you would like to attend this clinic please contact the instructor, Richard Keding, at 382-7498. The fee will be \$15 for members and \$35 for non-members. \$20 of the non-member fee is applied to a membership in the Club.

Rio Grande Cutthroat Trout Print



Spinney Reservoir Fishing Trip

Steve Lewis and Randy Hulsey

Editor's Note: Club members Steve Lewis (Elbert, CO) and Randy Hulsey (Colorado Springs, CO) fished Spinney Reservoir earlier this spring. Here is the second and final installment of their account of the trip.

Randy was driving that morning and as usual was not quite ready at the opening bell. So Steve jumped out as soon as Randy parked and hurried down to the shoreline to stake out a spot. (If the neighbors see you waving your fly rod around in an erratic fashion it helps establish some elbow room.) Randy says Steve is ready to fish first because he sleeps in his waders! The morning light was still insufficient to see into the water for sight casting to cruising fish. But, Steve still managed to hook three fish before Randy made it down to the shoreline. About the time Randy arrived, so did Steve's neighbor on the left. And we mean his immediate left; like six feet away when the next person was thirty yards to his left. Obviously, he liked the spot we were fishing. Probably the sight of each of us netting a 20-22 inch fish as he walked by was just too much of an attraction for him to pass by without stopping. He was very friendly and very talkative, also very close. Unfortunately, this crowding is typical of the first few days of fishing and while most people are courteous and at least allow some casting room for the fly rodders, some people just get too close and some are intimidated by the occasional lack of courtesy.

Our typical setup for opening day is an olive scud trailed behind an apricot supreme colored egg pattern. This is presented near or on the bottom. This setup is always a good producer and if the first few days are fortunate enough to coincide with the spawning cycle, this is a killer pattern and can make for exciting thirty fish days where the fish average between 17-20 inches. We know this is not like dry fly fishing or nymph fishing on a flowing stream or river like the San Juan or Rio Peñasco, but this method is very effective on reservoirs like Spinney early in the year. We typically fish with this setup most if not all of opening day. Randy is prone to more setup changes on opening day. He even tried a black wooly bugger for a few minutes. But, until the midges and may flies start hatching in large numbers, the olive scud and egg pattern appears to be the most productive pattern around the shoreline. After this initial period of good shoreline fishing, hare's ears, scuds, pheasant tails and large midge patterns were very good flies drifted above the weed beds. When the more intense may fly hatches begin topwater action can be fantastic, but the nymph and emerger patterns remain productive also. We had a great day in spite of the crowds. The delayed opening meant that we did not have the pleasure of watching the beautiful fish cruising the shoreline because the erratic pattern of freezing and thawing had enabled the fish to spawn but the reservoir was not open until completely ice-free. Our largest fish was a little over 25 inches. We had several over twenty inches and we caught over 25 fish in total.

The Dry Fly Knot

This month we present another knot that is useful to the flyfisher. The "Dry Fly Knot" is supposedly one of the best knots for attaching a fly to a tippet. George Harvey of Penn State University developed the

knot and promoted its use for many years.




Pass the working end through the eye and take a turn with it around the standing part of the line. Take a second turn around the line, overlapping the first one.






Tuck the working end twice through the two loops already formed.

Pull on the standing part while sliding the two turns in the opposite direction over the eye and around the shank of the hook.

Product Review Balloons as Strike Indicators

As Bob Silver said in last month's newsletter, while talking about closed cell foam indicators, a good strike indicator can help you catch more fish. It allows you to judge what your flies are doing under the water and it allows you to adjust the flies to the depth the fish are feeding. During the recent Club trip to the San Juan, my son Randy and I rented a drift boat for one of the days. After the guide rigged each of us up with a couple of flies and proper weight, I expected to see him tie a piece of macramé yarn on as a strike indicator. Instead he took out a large package of balloons of various colors. He said they were water balloons, so I guess that's a special type. They were quite small. He would blow one up a little larger than needed and then let air out until it was the desired size, about the diameter of a nickel. He would then stretch the neck and tie a knot in it to hold the air. He would then tie a second knot in it just below the first. The next step was to cut off the remainder of the neck below the second knot. The balloon was tied on between the knots using the same slip knot as would be used for the macramé. While rather unorthodox, I have to say they worked quite well. They were quite buoyant and very responsive to the slightest take. I fished with the same balloon for all of that day of drift fishing and a half day of wade fishing the next morning. When I was finished it was still in good shape and the good part was I never had to apply flotant.
