President's Corner

Anyone paying attention to the news of the day has probably heard some of the renewed complaints about national monuments and the Antiquities Act. While much of the recent rhetoric about alleged federal overreach has focused on the

new Bears Ears National Monument in Utah, comments about our own Organ Mountains-Desert Peaks National Monument are in the news as well. Late last month, an editorial was published in the *Las Cruces Sun-News* and the *El Paso Times* defending our monument from renewed attack, coming in part from our own Congressional representative Steve Pearce. Pearce was active in the opposition to the monument and now he wants to work with the new President to "modify" it, against the wishes of the majority of his constituents. Moreover, nearly everyone who lives near National Park Service lands recognizes the economic benefits of that proximity, including Las Cruces officials, realtors and business owners. Nevertheless, the efforts of the few to divest the many continue.

Representative Steve Pearce (R-NM) has cosponsored six pieces of legislation that cover land seizure, attacks to the Antiquities Act, and legislation that would prioritize logging over recreation and open new areas to roads and clear cutting. (Steve Casmiro, Adventure Journal, April 11, 2016)

In my job as a professor of anthropology and archaeology, I regularly teach a course on environmental law, cultural and heritage resources preservation, and public policy development. Given the apparent con-

fusion and misunderstandings about the Antiquities Act, I thought perhaps it would be useful to provide some background information about the law.

Like most environmental laws and regulations, the Antiquities Act of 1906 was not forced upon us by an oppressive government; it was

demanded by an outraged public. As far back as 1889, researchers on the privately funded Hemenway Southwestern Archaeological Expedition reported serious damage caused by looters at the site of Casa Grande, Arizona. [Note: looting is the archaeological equivalent of poaching.] Within the following decade,

it was discovered that the site of Pueblo Bonito in Chaco Canyon had been looted, and some of the stolen artifacts were sent to the Swedish Museum in Stockholm. As American citizens became aware of the magnificent geological features and prehistoric settlements found in the western U.S., there was growing concern that these resources were being permanently damaged. In response, private citizens, preservation groups and pro-

fessional researchers demanded that Congress take action to protect our national treasures. The legislation that eventually became the Antiquities Act of

1906 took six years to write, spanning three sessions of Congress and involving seven versions of the bill. It was signed in June of 1906 by President Theodore Roosevelt.

The Antiquities Act authorizes the President to declare by proclamation national monuments containing historic landmarks, prehistoric sites and other objects of historic or scientific interest on lands owned by the

U.S. government. Important, well known archaeological resources such as El Morro National Monument in New Mexico, Montezuma Castle National Monument, Arizona, and Scotts Bluff National Monument, Nebraska have been protected by the Antiquities Act.

More recently, some monuments have been designated to protect multiple resources, and multiple types of resources, rather

than just a single site. So, for example, Bears Ears National Monument is helping to preserve many archaeological sites and Native American sacred areas, as well as prominent geological formations. But in

addition, it is also "ensuring continued access to some of the best elk hunting, not just in the state, but the world" (Chris Carling, media representative for the Western Hunting and Conservation Expo). In our area, the Organ Mountains-Desert Peaks National Monument protects literally thousands of archaeological sites and many holy sites that are sacred to

the Mescalero Apaches.

and other Native Americans in the region. Some recently designated national monuments even contain excellent opportunities for fly fishing, such as

Berryessa Snow Mountain National Monument, California; Rio Grande del Norte National Monument, New Mexico; and Browns Canyon National Monument near Buena Vista, Colorado (links below).

If we want other outdoor enthusiasts to be supportive of fly angling and our continued access to fishing opportunities, it behooves us to respect the process embodied in the Antiquities Act, and support national monuments as part of the overall program of conservation in our country.

By stealing the lands where Americans recreate outdoors, the land heist threatens to destroy one of our nation's largest industries. Whether you enjoy fishing, hiking, whitewater rafting, skiing, hunting, stargazing, or camping, this affects you. (Wes Siler, outsideonline.com, Feb. 7, 2017)

In a nation like ours, our world is run by those who show up, and run best by those who show up informed and with clear suggestions and demands. Our national monuments provide some of the greatest hunting opportunities in the world. They will remain so as long as hunters get involved, and stay involved, in the public process. (Hal Herring, Field and Stream)

The same can be said for fishing opportunities and the involvement of anglers. We have an excellent opportunity to become actively involved in the planning process right now. The Gila National Forest recently released the Preliminary Environmental Assessment for Restoration of Gila Trout and other Native Fishes to Whitewater Creek, New Mexico. Whitewater Creek is one of my favorite fisheries, and I'm sure many other club members love it too. We have an opportunity to comment on the Environmental Assessment (EA) and show our support for the efforts to restore


gler trips is made available to women on our e-mail

Taylor Streit Bio



March speaker is well known New Mexico fly fishing personality, Taylor Streit. He will discuss portions of his latest book, *Instinctive Fly Fishing*, and fishing opportunities in the vicinity of Taos, New Mexico.

Taylor Streit was wading the fabled waters of New York's Cats-

kills before he was 10, and tying flies commercially and guiding in his teens. He moved to northern New Mexico in the late 1960s, where he opened Taos Fly Shop. He has guided fishermen for 40 years, primari-

ly in New Mexico, but in the Bahamas and Argentina as well. Guiding is what has paid the bills: "There's been no trust fund or endorsements; if



the clients don't catch, we don't eat." In 2001 Taylor was inducted into the Freshwater Fishing Hall of Fame as a legendary guide. He has authored four books on

fly fishing: Fly Fishing New Mexico, Man vs. Fish-The Fly

Fisherman's Eternal Struggle, and Instinctive Fly Fishing (I and II). He has developed a number of fly patterns, including the mighty Poundmeister, and he writes and does photography for various magazines and periodicals. He recently relocated to Truth or Consequences, and his son Nick now runs the Taos Fly Shop (taosflyshop.com) (https://youtu.be/dSuiPHqUFmI), but Taylor continues to conduct fly fishing schools annually. He will have books for sale and literature on his fly fishing schools available at the club meeting.

Open Comment Period for Whitewater Creek Gila Trout Restoration

The Preliminary Environmental Assessment for the proposed Whitewater Creek Gila Trout Recovery Project has been posted, and a Comment Period is now open until March 14th. The proposed action (Alternative One) would restore Gila trout and the other specified native fishes to Whitewater Creek and its tributaries after successful removal of non-native salmonids. This project consists of three major components: 1) Removal of Non-native Salmonids; 2) Stocking of Gila trout, speckled dace, desert sucker, and Sonora sucker once removal of non-native salmonids has been confirmed, with the goal of establishing viable and self-sustaining populations; and 3) Reconstruction and maintenance of the Whitewater Trail (#207) to provide public access. The Gila/Rio Grande Chapter of Trout Unlimited enthusiastically supports this project.

Rio Grande Gorge-Rio Grande Cutthroat Trout stocking Monday, Mar. 27th, 2017

Volunteers are needed to help pack and stock fingerling RGCT in the Rio Grande Gorge. There are ~5,000 lively native trout raised at the Seven Spring State Fish Hatchery that will be packed down into the Rio Grande Gorge on one of the Wild River trails near Questa, NM. The hike down, stocking, and hike up should take about 3-4 hours. Volunteers should plan to carry about 2-4 gallons of water in plastic bags with 50-150 trout. Participants should bring a backpack, good hiking boots, sunscreen, drinking water, hat, lunch, and fishing gear for those interested in spending a little more time in the canyon. The group will meet at the La Junta trailhead in the BLM Wild Rivers at 10:00 AM on March 27th. To get to the La Junta trailhead from Questa drive north on Highway 522, after about 2.5 miles turn west (left) onto Highway 378. Continue on Highway 378 through Cerro and into the Wild Rivers area. Highway 378 will eventually head south along the gorge rim. Continue on Highway 378 until you see the La Junta trailhead sign.

Planning is in progress for a volunteer effort that will

involve habitat assessments and identification of habitat improvement strategies for Willow Creek. The project is funded by a grant from the



National Wilderness Stewardship Alliance. Our initial efforts to access the site to deploy temperature and

flow intermittency data loggers, and to select habitat assessment study reaches was delayed due to snow (a very good reason!). This effort will be rescheduled when weather permits and in coordination with NMDGF biologists planning to sample Gila trout for streamside spawning and collection of environmental DNA samples for analysis by USFS biologists. The big volunteer effort will take place in April; the dates are still to be determined at this time, so if you are interested please send an email to: jeffgilatu@aol.com.


Club Outings Planned

MVFF Board Meeting Minutes

Monday, February 20, 2017 Submitted by Jeff Arterburn, Secretary

The MVFF Board meeting was called to order by President David Carmichael at 7:00pm. in the NMDG&F Conference room. Board members present were: Jeff Arterburn (Secretary), David Carmichael (President), Evan Claassen, Tom Johnson (Vice President), Will Lubenau, Chuck Mueller and Bob Silver. Board Members absent were: Dennis Lanpher and Gary Mann (Treasurer). Non-Board members in attendance were: Ron Bellerose, Jim Hulsey, Dominique Lujan and Tom Wobbe.

- 1. **Meeting Minutes.** The minutes from the January 9, 2017 Board meeting were approved as published in the February 2017 issue of the newsletter.
- Treasurer's Report. The Treasurer's report and current account balance statement of \$13,453 was presented by Tom Wobbe, and accepted by the Board.
- 3. **Membership Report.** Tom Wobbe reported that the distribution list consists of 372 email contacts. The list of current/active members will be updated. There have been 8 new members so far this year (Jan-Feb). The 2017 Banquet Recap showed 85 attendees, the amount of food provided was agreed to be appropriate for the event. Reconciliation of expenses and funds raised showed a net (-\$324) that was more favorable than the previous five years. Fishing permit sales for 2016 totaled 257 transactions.
- 4. Project Healing Waters. Ron Bellerose reported that the PHW raffle at the banquet was successful. Ron attended the PHW organizational meeting in Long Beach, California on Feb 18–19. He reported that a lot is happening within the organization: a new CEO, administrative and quarterly report procedures transitioning to new electronic formats, policy changes requiring program leads to have background checks, and other operational changes. PHW has developed a successful casting competition program, which may also be of general interest for MVFF events. Ron also reported on the recent trip to Silver Creek AZ trip that was

made possible with the help of the Tucson branch of PHW, during which Ron and Jim Sorenson facilitated 2 veterans who experienced "tremendous" fishing. Ron is planning for a possible return trip March 26-28. Ron and the Veterans group are holding thrice-monthly fly tying sessions, with 2 sessions at the Counseling Center, Las Cruces, on the 1st & 3rd Wednesdays from 10 am-12 pm, and the 3rd session taking place on the last Wednesday of month at the VA clinic on Don Rosa from 1-3 pm. Ron has also been contacted by the Manager of the Las Cruces Sportsman's Warehouse, Bill Batt, with regards to "FlyTying 101" sessions to be held on Saturdays from 12-2 pm. The Board is supportive and will help to coordinate these activities with Ron, with more planning and details to be reported as they develop.

5. Gila/Rio Grande chapter of Trout Unlimited. Jeff Arterburn reported on the successful outcomes from the booth at the Mesilla Valley Outdoor Expo, during which he, Ron, Dave, and Bob made contact with a large number of attendees and distributed information about the TU, MVFF and PHW programs and activities. A free youth raffle for a TU-sponsored L.L. Bean fly rod outfit attracted almost 100 entries and the winner was a very happy and excited Makayla McCabe. The Willow Creek project funded by the National Wilderness Stewardship Alliance is underway and TU has purchased the temperature data-loggers for in-stream installation, and the TU contractor has adapted survey assessment protocols for the upcoming work project in April (dates TBD). Preliminary survey dates are being planned, as weather and snow pack conditions allow. Jeff and Brad Shuster will attend the NM-TU Council Meeting March 4-5, held at Coopers El Vado Lodge, with plans for site visits to TU conservation project sites in the area, and the new catch & release section of the Chama where funding for special regulation signage is needed. A volunteer stock-

- ing of Rio Grande Cutthroat Trout in the Rio Grande Gorge will be held on March 27^{th.} The Preliminary Environmental Assessment for the proposed Whitewater Creek. Gila Trout Recovery Project has been posted, and a Comment Period is now open until March 14th. TU enthusiastically supports this project that will restore Gila Trout and other native fish (Desert Sucker, Sonora Sucker, and Speckled Dace) to this watershed, following removal of non-native fish, and will rebuild access trails.
- 6. American Fisheries Society. Will Lubeneau reported that the student groups would like to have a basic fly rod gear and casting class, which the Board agrees to provide, and he will check with students to identify the best time. There is also interest in a subsequent fishing day. The Departmental Banquet will be held on April 20th, with fund raising Raffle and Silent Auction. Details will be provided as they are finalized.
- 7. **General Meeting Speakers/Presentations**. The schedule for General Meeting's has been finalized: March 13th (Taylor Streit, "Instinctive Fly Fishing"); April 10th (Laurence D'Alessandro "Special Trout Waters"); May 8th (Jason Amaro "Fly Fishing for Smallmouth Bass in NM's Gila River".
- 8. Club Fishing Trips. Evan Claassen is interested in organizing a trip to the Gila that will target fishing for smallmouth bass, and he will be identifying interested members, and planning for possible dates.
- 9. **Kid's Fishing Clinic.** The annual clinic will be held Saturday March 25th, 9am-2 pm, and NMDGF will be stocking trout for the event. The Board has previously authorized Tom Wobbe to purchase rod combinations (100), prizes and food/drinks. The club will need help running stations, setting up canopy, ice chest, pizza's, etc.

10. Other News & Events. Chuck reported that the Rod building class is going well, with 7 rod's under construction. Another 3 members have expressed interest in building rods, and Chuck will coordinate with them. Bob Silver initiated a discussion regarding the involvement of the MVFF organization in the ongoing Public Lands debate, and advocacy of issues relating to fishing that are important for the club members. The consensus of the Board was to address specific issues on a case-by-case basis, and Members are encouraged to express their individual views. Carmichael raised the topic of electronic payment management for permit sales, membership renewals, etc. and identified a commercial provider able to do this, for a price. The option of MVFF implementing PayPal for memberships and permits was revisited, and Bob Silver and Tom Johnson will plan to continue investigating these options, and discussing the associated web page management with Jim Hulsey, and will return with further recommendations. A Request for another Beginner's Fly Fishing Class has been received, and Bob Siler and Jeff Arterburn will coordinate possible dates for holding classes. Bob Widgren contacted Bob Silver, regarding a young man with special needs living in Las Cruces, who is very interested in learning to fly fish, and desiring an opportunity for mentoring help using a special Widgren-designed fly rod. Bob Silver volunteered and will host a trip to the lease. Plans are developing to investigate the possibility of hosting the Fly Fishing Film Tour. MVFF merchandise has been selling well, and needs to be re-ordered. The Board sends well-wishes to longtime MVFF friends Sam Moore and Alison Mann, both of whom are recovering from recent health issues.

The next Board meeting will be on Monday, March 20, 2017 at 7:00pm.

Meeting was adjourned at 9pm.

There are several options for the payment of dues. A family is defined as a club member, their spouse and all children 17 years of age or under.



Lease Information

Permits to fish the Club leased waters on the Rio Peñasco can be obtained from Jim Hulsey (575–524–1880), Tom Wobbe (575–522–5437) and Donna Mabie (575–522–3810) in Las Cruces. Permits can be obtained from the land owner, but you should phone (575–687–3362) the night before to ensure someone will be there to sell them to you. Permits can be ordered through the club web page (mvff.org) by filling out the form and mailing as directed. Cost is \$25.00 per day. Kids under 18 fish free but must be accompanied by an adult club member with a permit. You must be a current member (current dues have been paid) of MVFF to fish the lease.
