Editor's note: On 15 October, MVFF volunteers took a group of soldiers from Fort Bliss on a fishing trip to the Rio Peñasco lease as part of their PTSD rehabilitation program. The following note was received shortly afterwards from Dr. Thomas.

Once again the day on the river was a great hit. Yesterday I asked one of the soldiers about his experience. He expressed some regret about not catching any fish but went on to talk about feeling "alive" as he played in the waterfall. I suspect some of his luck fishing was influenced by his enthusiasm about being in the mountains and his playfulness may have scared any fish in the area. I would never before have used "playful" to describe this Soldier, so I'm pleased with his reaction and hope his mentors are too.

Most of our Soldiers caught fish including a young man who had never fished before in his life. This Soldier is new to the program and initially he appeared quite reluctant to step outside his comfort zone. He had no experience fishing, few friends in the program, and I wasn't sure he would be able to relax enough to enjoy the experience. After lunch the groups started dividing up so that those with family obligations could get home. This Soldier was first in line for a seat on the van staying late for those wanting to fish for an hour or two longer. He grinned as he followed his volunteer fishing mentor to retrieve his gear, literally jumping over a low wall in his eagerness to get back to the river. I watched as he joined the other soldiers hiking down the dirt road to the river and noted that his usual hesitant movements had been replaced with energetic strides. When he

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returned, he excitedly shared that he had caught "three more fish".

You have no idea how exciting it is for us to watch the changes in our Service Members when they let the experience break through their defenses. Please let all of the volunteers who share their time and expertise know how important their contributions are to us and how much we appreciate their efforts. I look forward to our next trip!

Project Healing Waters

In the early days of October this year, seven of us ladies gathered up in the canyons of the Pecos River for a couple of days of brilliant fly fishing. We were met with outrageous colors, beautiful shimmering golds and yellows, ruby reds dripping down the Sangre de Cristo mountainsides with the usual jade and forest greens intermixed. The tame river was quietly gurgling with the shadows of fish, perfectly camouflaged, down in the mornings, rising in the afternoons. The water would prove fruitful and challenging.

I arrived from the north and east, pushing a very strong noisy front air mass back toward California as dusk fell. Others arrived earlier with the same air mass battering their vehicles from the west. As we approached the cabins, wild turkey were spotted moving back up the hills from acorn gathering in the oak copses near the windy bridge.

When one travels to the Santa Fe National Forest, pleasant traveling companions are much appreciated for night falls quickly allowing time for sharing good dinners in the cabins, accoutered with comfortable old or new furniture. Later, the stories and tall tales unwind before a comfortable fire. The area draws celebrity fishers as well as promising adventurers and we were lucky to have both in our group. German browns liked the bead-head pheasant tails while the parachute blue wing olives and similar flies were successful later in the day. One beautiful mature mayfly attracted much attention from the fish. We hired guides for the first day which was an excellent decision. The guides were superb in selecting areas along the river with deep pools swarming with fish. They were patient in teaching strategies to those who sought guidance and respectful of those who did not. Their suggestions about clothing, equipment and gear before the trip made us comfortable and successful. Only one of us fell into the river, but nobody noticed. Others could not hear the splashing over the water's current. The high waders, felt boots and Velcro at the wrists, kept most of the cold water out.

Our thanks go out to the members of the Mesilla Valley Fly Fishers who shared their knowledge, their casting skills and many moments of patient knot and fly tying. Clinics before the trip contributed much to the success and pleasure of our trip. Also, the ATF Fly Shop in El Paso as well as the Los Pinos Fly shop in Albuquerque provided good equipment and advice for this trip.

I invite you to visit the Pecos River soon for a fishing trip. The incredible beauty of the area will draw your camera eye to follow the wind in the golden Aspen leaves and then the American Dipper birds as they skip over the waters. You will smell the sap from the Ponderosa pines and Englemann Spruce. And, you won't be disappointed about the fish at the end of your rod.

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Black Beauty

Because of meeting problems last month, the center of attention for the Liars and Tyers this month will again be the *Black Beauty*.

The Black Beauty was developed by Pat Dorsey and here is what Charlie Craven has to say about it on his website: "Pat Dorsey, the illustrious South Platte River guide, popularized the Black Beauty in recent years. The Black Beauty is the ultimate guide fly; quick and easy to tie, durable and the thing catches fish. The Black Beauty is the basis for a number of other patterns with just slight differences. Tie it with white thread and a black or gray dubbed or marker colored head and you've got a Miracle Nymph, add a silver bead, substitute silver wire for the rib and you have a Zebra Midge, red thread and no head makes a Blood Midge. You get the idea, a simple thread body ribbed with wire for segmentation and flash and a small dubbed head combine to match a variety of midge larva. You can tie up a complete size and color range to match midges anywhere using this fly as a pattern and varying the colors. Don't forget to tie some with small metal or glass bead heads, too. I use the Black Beauty and other thread midges on a dropper behind a Pheasant Tail or RS-II much of the time and in tandem with a Brassie or Poison Tung during the winter months. This fly is particularly successful on tail waters and holds it's own on freestone rivers during low water periods and the winter."

The MVFF Board meeting, presided over by President Jeff Arterburn, was called to order at 7:00pm in the NMDG&F Conference Room.

In attendance were Jeff Arterburn, Tom Wobbe, Jim Hulsey, Jim Sorenson, George Sanders, Robert Silver, Gary Mann, Donna Mabie, George Thomas, Ron Bellerose, and guest attendees Randall and Vicki Vallee, Richard Keding and Jerry Schickedanz.

- 1. Minutes of the September Board meeting, as published in the October newsletter, were approved with one correction, the Treasurer's Report balance of \$13,843.00 should have read 14,728.00.
- 2. The Treasurer's Report as presented by Treasurer Gary Mann was approved and shows a balance of \$14,139.
- 3. Tom Wobbe reported that there are 208 paid members to date, 75 of which are from Las Cruces, 55 from El Paso and the rest from elsewhere.
- 4. Clarification was made as to how the Norman J. Mabie Scholarship will be handled through the New Mexico State University College of Agriculture, Consumer and Environmental Sciences. Efforts will be made to publicize the scholarship to a wider audience.
- 5. Jim Sorenson agreed to head up the By-Laws Committee.
- 6. The potential for initiating a local Trout Unlimited chapter was discussed. The November general meeting will feature a presentation by Bill Schudlich and Greg McReynolds discussing NM Trout Unlimited's contributions towards native trout recovery projects in New Mexico.

- John Tavenner, who has worked on the San Juan River for 18 years, will do a presentation at the December 2009 Club general membership meeting.
- 8. Gary Mann reported that he has solicited discounted items for the raffle to be held during the banquet in January. These items include Sage rods, Winston rods, TFO rods, Ross reel, Galvan reel, Lamson reel and spool, Simms waders, etc. He was given permission to proceed and funds for such were approved. Additional door prizes will be awarded at the banquet, and a separate drawing will be held from the collected pool of tickets submitted during authorized club functions this year.
- 9. No Club trips are planned as of now.
- 10. Twenty Project Healing Waters members attended the fishing at the Club waters and were assisted by 12 Club volunteers. Fish were caught and the food was good.
- 11. Ongoing monitoring of club waters will provide information to decide if additional fish stocking should be pursued this year.
- 12. The ranch manager at the Rio Peñasco lease observed two members camping on the grounds without permission, and also fishing two days with submission of a single permit. The Board will contact the involved individuals and pursue appropriate conclusion of the issue.
- 13. Ron Bellerose reported on the status of the Project Healing Waters project.
- 14. Jerry Schickedanz discussed the protocol issue of Club support in wilderness matters.

The meeting was adjourned at 8:42pm.


Lease Information

Permits to fish the Club leased waters on the Rio Peñasco can be obtained from any of the Club Officers or Board Members and are also available at the *Angler's Nook* (575-522-3810) in Las Cruces and the ATF fly shop in El Paso (915-225-0570.) Permits can be obtained from the land owner, but you should phone (575-687-3362) the night before to ensure someone will be there to sell them to you. Permits can be ordered through the club web page (mvff.org) by filling out the form and mailing as directed. Cost is \$25.00 per day. Kids under 18 fish free but must be accompanied by an adult club member with a permit. You must be a current member of MVFF to fish the lease. Please wear your MVFF identification badge while on the property. New or replacement badges can be obtained by

Follow NM 82 east from Cloudcroft, NM or west from Artesia, NM. The turn off to the lease is located on the right side of the road about 100 yards before mile marker 54 coming from Cloudcroft or 100 yards on the left past mile marker 54 coming from Artesia.
